Sri Lanka's Integrated Watershed and Water Resources Management Project (IWWRMP) is making significant strides in improving watershed and water resource planning and enhancing water infrastructure functionality. Launched in May 2021 under the Ministry of Irrigation, the project aims to ensure sustainable water usage across the nation.

Originally a five-year initiative, the IWWRMP received a one-year extension following the restitution of USD 25 million in previously cancelled funds. The project's revised financial structure includes USD 69.53 million from the International Development Association (IDA) and USD 0.50 million from the Government of Sri Lanka (GOSL). An additional USD 10 million, also restitution, has been earmarked for community-based initiatives, targeted for completion by December 31, 2024.

Watershed and Water Resources Planning (USD 11.36 million): This component supports watershed restoration and multi-sector water resource planning. A

key initiative involves collaboration with the International Water Management Institute (IWMI) to develop a comprehensive Watershed Management Plan for the Upper Mahaweli Watershed, covering three districts. Over 200 mini-watershed plans are expected in the final report.

Infrastructure Improvements (USD 55.29 million): This substantial portion of the budget is dedicated to rehabilitating dams and irrigation infrastructure under the Irrigation Department and the Mahaweli Authority of Sri Lanka. Upgrades are also underway in the Northern and Eastern Provincial Councils. Progress includes work on 29 dams and 21 canals. Small and medium irrigation infrastructure rehabilitation works are being implemented through Community-Based Organizations (CBOs), completion of 761 project across the country.

The project also plays a vital role in supporting the Prime Minister's Office in developing and implementing a National Water Policy, including the establishment of a National Water Resources Secretariat, the introduction of comprehensive water laws, and the development of a strategic national water plan.

With restituted funding and ongoing momentum, the IWWRMP is well-positioned to achieve its objectives and contribute significantly to the long-term sustainability and functionality of Sri Lanka's vital water resources.

Rehabilitation works done under Irrigation Department

The IWWRMP has made significant strides in improving irrigation infrastructure across multiple districts, addressing long-standing challenges in watershed management, and ensuring equitable water distribution. The project's focus on rehabilitating major irrigation schemes, such as Senanayaka Samudraya, Akathimurippu Tank Bund, and Nagadeepa Tank Bund, exemplifies our commitment to safeguarding the nation's water security.

With dedicated efforts and the valuable guidance from the Project Management Unit, we have successfully achieved several construction milestones while upholding quality and environmental standards. Through transparent reporting, effective implementation strategies, and a strong commitment to sustainable development we are confident that this project will continue to make a positive impact on Sri Lanka's agricultural and water management sectors.

It has been planned to carry out numerous irrigation projects with the funds received under phase 2 also.

Rehabilitated Canal System to Uplift Livelihood

In 2022, Sri Lanka faced its deepest economic crisis, leading to a rapid rise in poverty among farmer community. The crisis caused significant livelihood losses, reduced all kind of incomes, limited access to essential fuel, fertilizer, food etc. Due to severe food insecurity was generated throughout the country. This crisis resulted in substantial losses in livelihoods, a reduction in all forms of income, and

Organization received approximately Rs. 3.4 million for this project, benefiting 10 member families. The rehabilitation efforts involved canal improvements which provided irrigable water to 50 acres of land.

During the 2022 economic crisis, this paddy field had been abandoned due to a lack of water. However, with World Bank funding, farming activities were



restricted access to essential resources such as fuel and food. Consequently, the country faced widespread food insecurity.

Therefore, immediate action was crucial for stabilizing affected communities.

To address this urgent need, the Integrated Watershed and Water Resources Management Project (IWWRMP) allocated US\$10 million to support community initiatives, focusing on the rehabilitation of small and micro irrigation systems. The primary goal was to inject funds into rural communities through community contracting, thereby improving livelihoods and repairing essential infrastructure at the ground level.

The IWWRMP engaged over 800 farmer organizations nationwide to undertake various tasks, including repairing sluice gates, dilapidated field canals, canal bunds, spillways, and abandoned small ponds and tanks. Activities also included canal desilting and repairing damaged flood and canal bunds.

One notable project was the rehabilitation of the FC 31 canal, located 8 km from the main canal in Muhanthankulam, Mannar District, Northern Province. The Muhanthankulam Farmer

able to resume. Kanapathipillai Balakrisnan, President of the Farmer Organization, was one of the beneficiaries of this scheme. Balakrisnan cultivates various types of paddy and also manages a poultry farm. His wife assists with both the paddy cultivation and the poultry farm. They have three school-aged children.

During the crisis, Balakrisnan struggled to make lease payments for his combine harvester and faced difficulties feeding his family and supporting his children's education.

"Before the crisis, my monthly income was Rs. 80,000. During the crisis, it dropped to Rs. 30,000 per month. However, after receiving World Bank funding for canal rehabilitation, my income has increased to Rs. 100,000 per month," Balakrisnan reported. With this improvement, he was able to lease a tractor and motor bicycle, cover the monthly payment, and support his children's education.

Balakrisnan now sells his harvest to government buying institutions and private buyers, achieving self-sufficiency in rice and providing for his family throughout the year. His experience reflects the positive impact of the canal rehabilitation scheme, which has been similarly beneficial for other farmers.

Rehabilitation works done under the Northern Provincial Council - Irrigation Department

The IWWRMP intervention under the Northern Provincial Council - Irrigation Department significantly improved irrigation and water management across several schemes. At the Muththuiyankaddu Tank, the project enabled the cultivation of 85 acres of paddy land in Track 05 after 55 years and 30 acres in Track 02 after 40 years, while also implementing effective water management across multiple Tracks. The Kalmadu Scheme rehabilitation addressed severe erosion and seepage by constructing an SCB barrier wall, improving drainage, and enhancing irrigation for 2,500 acres in Yala and 7,500 acres in Maha seasons. In the Piramanthalaru Irrigation Scheme, the project focused on critical downstream channel rehabilitation, increasing irrigation to 65 acres and reducing water wastage. Similarly, the Kanagambikai Irrigation Scheme improved water distribution by rehabilitating branch and distribution channels, securing irrigation for approximately 40 acres and supporting sustainable agriculture. These interventions have collectively improved agricultural productivity, water efficiency, and farmer livelihoods.

Safeguarding the Upper Mahaweli Watershed for future generations

Sri Lanka's longest river, the Mahaweli, plays a crucial role in the nation's water resources, agriculture and livelihoods. Its upper catchment, known as the Upper Mahaweli Watershed (UMW), spanning 3,111 km² across the Kandy, Nuwara Eliya, and Badulla districts in 36 Divisional Secretariats (DS), supports over three million people. Rapid land degradation due to deforestation, soil erosion, and unsustainable agricultural practices, however, threatens the watershed's ability to sustain water supplies, agriculture, and biodiversity.

Challenges in the Upper Mahaweli Watershed:

Available scientific and other evidence shows that the catchment area is degrading and that its capacity to support productive services, including water supplies, is diminishing. Soil erosion is a significant issue in the UMW, particularly in hilly areas with intensive vegetable and tea cultivation. Studies indicate that Kandy (32%), Nuwara Eliya (40.7%), and Badulla (36.5%) experience high erosion hazards, leading to reservoir sedimentation and reduced water availability for agriculture.

To address these challenges, the Integrated Watershed and Water Resources Management Project (IWWRMP), awards consultancy service to the International Water Management Institute (IWMI) for preparation of UMW Management Plan (UMWMP) at Mini watershed level. The UMWMP is included several comprehensive strategies such as Soil and water resourced conservation activities (on-farm and off-farm), Identification of stream reservations and stream conservation, Water resources management for drinking and irrigation water use, Management of areas bordering forests and tea plantations, Livelihood improvement activities, etc.

Collaborative planning for sustainable watershed management: A multi-stakeholder approach is essential for effective watershed management. The planning process involves participation of Grassroots Level Planning Committees (GPCs) and Multi-Disciplinary Mini Watershed Level Planning Committees (MDMWPCs). The GPCs bring together local government officers (GN, ARPA, EDO, and SDO) and three community representatives, while MDMWPC includes technical experts from line agencies (Eg. Irrigation Department) to identify watershed issues and develop targeted solutions.

Progress of preparation of UMWMP: The planning process has been completed in the four Divisional Secretariat Divisions (DSDs) of Pathahewaheta, Deltota, Hanguranketha and Mathurata - resulting in 26 Mini Watershed Management Plans. The implementation of the MWMPs is set to commence soon, with priority given to soil conservation, forest management and stream reservation efforts. The first phase of implementation will focus on Pathahewaheta DSD, followed by other regions as the planning progresses.

A sustainable future for the Upper Mahaweli Watershed: The UMWMP represents a critical step towards ensuring the long-term health of the Mahaweli watershed. By integrating scientific research, community participation and institutional collaboration, this initiative aims to restore degraded lands, enhance water security, and improve the livelihoods of local communities. With continued efforts and stakeholder commitment, the Upper Mahaweli Watershed can thrive as a vital resource for future generations.

Rehabilitation works done under the Eastern Provincial Council - Irrigation Department

Aimed to enhance water management and agricultural productivity in the Meiyankal and Adachchakal schemes. The Meiyankal scheme rehabilitation focused on addressing severe erosion, scour, and seepage in the tank bund by including Rip Rap and sluices, thereby improving dam safety and irrigation capacity. Once completed, the tank will ensure irrigation for 2,490 acres in Maha and 1,835 acres in Yala, benefiting 600 farmer families and supporting local fishing Communities. Meanwhile, the Adachchakal scheme faced low water conveyance efficiency (below 40%) due to seepage and outdated irrigation structures. Rehabilitation efforts included improving the channel system to increase efficiency to 70%, optimizing water distribution for sustainable management, and increasing the cultivable area and crop intensity by 25%. These improvements will support 350 farmer families, securing irrigation for 1,002 acres in Maha and 515 acres in Yala, ultimately enhancing water security and agricultural productivity.

Water Resources Board (WRB) is the key agency responsible for groundwater management in Sri Lanka. Under the Integrated Watershed and Water Resources Management Project (IWWRMP), significant support is being provided to enhance knowledge-based, integrated groundwater management plans for eight pilot basins: Malwathu Oya, Kumbukkan Oya, Maduru Oya, Ma Oya, Deduru Oya, Mee Oya, the Kelani Basin, and the Jaffna Peninsula. The primary objective of this initiative is to ensure the long-term sustainability of groundwater resources across the country. To achieve this, IWWRMP is actively supporting the WRB by facilitating the procurement of essential chemicals, equipment, and other necessary resources. This collaborative effort aims to strengthen groundwater monitoring, assessment, and management, ultimately safeguarding this vital resource for future generations.
